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

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
Yr 9 CAREER DAY, PORTLAND

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AG NEWS- YR 10 SHEARING

The year 10 Agriculture students, last week, were lucky enough to have Sharna and Nathan Fidler share their expertise on shearing and wool handling. The class was split in half with half, one half learning aspects of shearing and the other half learning the aspects of wool handling. Nathan calmly and consciously instructed students on critical shearing techniques including, animal handling, positioning the sheep, and the various blows. While Sharna carefully explain the intricacies of wool handling such as wool characteristics of the different parts of the fleece, fleece length, contaminants and practices affect price received for wool, the process wool goes through from farm to garment and practical aspects of being a rouseabout such as throwing, skirting a fleece, and categorising parts of the fleece. This was the first of a two-day workshop. This Friday the students will be out on farm further practicing their skills in a fully functioning shearing shed. Nathan and Sharna thank you so much for your time time and knowledge. Your knowledge and skills are extremely valuable.















