### Around the School

- The driveway project is slowly edging its way towards completion. We expect the curbing and asphalt to be finished within the next few weeks. Bollards will be installed and the lines for the staff carpark spaces completed.
- The basketball court fence and towers have been removed thanks to Jeff Goodwin and Phil Niewand. The new fence and towers have been ordered. The synpave surfacing may not be completed until Term 4 depends on weather conditions.
- The new outdoor eating and learning space is almost finished and is looking fabulous! The seating and shade sails have been installed and the irrigation system and plants are in the process of being installed/planted.

### <u>Uniform</u>

With the cold weather fast approaching it is timely to remind parents/carers and students of the *revised uniform policy*. We expect all students to wear correct uniform. ### **Attendance**

Many students have their educational progress severely interrupted by absences which are more often than not, unnecessary, such as appointments in preparation for a social event, buying a new pair of shoes etc.

To reach their potential at school, **students need to attend regularly.** This means a few days off per year due to genuine illness or other very important family issues, not a 9 -day fortnight which accumulates to 20 days absent, 120 periods absent, the equivalent of 4 school weeks absent in a year. How could any student be expected to keep up with work in such circumstances?

Parents/carers have a critical role to play in protecting their child's future. Parents/carers also have a legal responsibility to ensure their children attend school regularly.

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Please support the school and your child's learning by arranging dental and doctor's appointments after school or during school holidays. Shopping, helping at home, and visiting relatives may seem important at the time – but not as important as your child's future.

Studies show there is a greater chance of students becoming early school leavers and/or long-term unemployed adults, if they don't attend school regularly.

Should you require support with your child's attendance, or any other issue please contact the relevant subschool leader immediately.

We can work together to make a difference to your child's future because, **EVERYDAY COUNTS.**

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# MUSIC LESSONS are back in school.



# YEAR 8, BUDJ BIM EXCURSION

All students of Year 8 headed out to our local UNESCO World Heritage site, Budj Bim Cultural Landscape, for a guided tour of the park with a focus on landscape and the Gunditjmara people. Three culturally significant places (Budj Bim, Kurtonitj and Tae Rak) were visited where students had the opportunity to learn about the volcanic activity in the area and the transformation of the landscape as a result, as well as to view parts of the oldest aquaculture system in existence - eel traps.

Our guide, Steven Lovett, spoke about land management and his personal connection to the area. We were fortunate to be supported by Tania Parker from the Glenelg Hopkins Catchment Management Authority who joined us on our tour and informed us of her responsibilities as the Senior Waterways Officer. Students learned a great deal about why Budj Bim has become internationally recognised, the different components of the Budj Bim Cultural Landscape and the ways of the Gunditjmara people.





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# SCIENCE

### **AGRICULTURE** News

During this semester, there are several projects underway.

**Year 9** are in the Aquaculture centre and looking after 50 rainbow trout fingerlings. Each lesson they test the water quality for the fish, which includes temperature, pH, Ammonia, Nitrites, Nitrates and Water Hardness. They discuss why these are important for the rainbow trout. They also weigh and measure the trout once a week to gauge their growth and to calculate the feed requirements of fish.





**Year 10** have been looking at soil and have started the process of modifying the cattle yards following the highly informative class we had with yard builder Zac Michau. Zac worked with the year 10 students at the end of last term discussing how the current cattle yard system can be better utilised for classes.

Year 11 students continue to work on their enterprises. One group are growing flowers, for cut flowers and have been trying Resin coasters as a value add to their enterprise. Students are looking at budgets and farm systems in relation to their enterprise and value adding.

Fresh eggs are available for sale in the school also, as the raising on chickens is another enterprise.

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#### Careers

All students have completed their Career Action Plans and set their goals for 2024. The year 12 students have started their conversations and planning for 2025 and beyond. A comprehensive university application booklet will be sent home providing additional information and an application 'step-by- step' guide.

### <u>Year 9</u>

The year nine students are about to participate in the Future Me program that will be conducted by the Deakin University. This program helps the students explore the ever-changing world of work. Students are provided with a range of opportunities to develop their employability skills, including communication. During the second session guest speakers from our community and beyond will be involved in a speed conversation activity with two-three students at a time. This involves the year nines interviewing our guests about their career pathways and choices.

Furthermore, the Department of Education is making available for all year nine students a personal online career discovery tool (Morrisby Online) which provides objective and relevant information about the student and the opportunities available. Your child will receive a confidential profile generated through the online career discovery tool. The online profile will be completed on the 23<sup>rd</sup> of May. Please return the consent forms sent home with you child last week. Students will be provided with a report and a 1:1 career feedback interview in term three. There is an opportunity for the Parent/Guardian to join the session with the qualified Careers Consultant and your child, more information to come.

### Year 10 updates

They have also been busy participating in various activities and planning for future events:

- Completed a resume.
- Achieved a safe@work certificate.
- Completed a Career Profile.
- Completed their Career Action Plan.
- Attended a year 10 information evening, with their parents and or guardians.

• Will attend a Taster Day in Hamilton on the 25<sup>th</sup> of June. (forms and information to be sent home shortly) <u>Students have secured a placement for the first of their two work experience blocks, which is scheduled for</u> <u>the 27<sup>th</sup> -31<sup>st</sup> of May. During the upcoming weeks a copy of the relevant paperwork will be sent to parents</u> <u>and employers for their records.</u> Students will also contact their employer the week before placement to confirm the details specific to their placement. Where practical, a staff member will visit the workplace.

### Placement visits

Last term employers were contacted via phone and were asked to evaluate student progress and suggest areas for improvement, as well as discussing their strengths. Overall, some very pleasing feedback. Towards the end of this term staff members will ring employers to arrange an onsite visit.

**Open Days** are held throughout the year. Sometimes they are University or TAFE focussed other times they are facility focused, they can be online, or campus based.
